After 28 years as the Executive Director of the National Governors Association (NGA), Ray Scheppach is now serving a joint appointment at the University of Virginia. He is a Professor of Practice at the Frank Batten School of Leadership and Public Policy and Visiting Fellow for

Economic Policy at the Miller Center for Public Affairs.

Prior to the National Governors Association, Ray worked for seven years at the Congressional Budget Office, serving the last two years as Deputy Director. He has written numerous professional articles on various public policy issues and has authored or co-authored four books on economics. His specializations include federal and state budgets, health care policy, energy policy and United States federalism.

Ray has been listed as a top association lobbyist by the Hill Magazine for 2006, 2008 and 2010, and is a fellow of the National Academy of Public Administration and at the National Academy of Social Insurance. Ray received his bachelor's degree in business administration from the University of Maine, and his master's and doctorate degrees in economics from the University of Connecticut.

Honoring Mary Turkington, Kansas Turnpike Authority Chairman

Mary Turkington will be honored as IBTTA's newest Honorary Member during the opening session on Monday, July 18, 2011.

A resident of Topeka, Kansas, Mary was first appointed to the Authority in May 1997 by Governor Bill Graves. She was elected Chairman of the Authority in October 2000, and was reappointed to the Authority by Governor Kathleen Sebelius in May 2005. Governor Mark Parkinson reappointed her for an additional four-year term in May 2009.

Until her retirement in 1997, Mary served as Executive Director of the Kansas Motor Carriers Association since 1968 and had worked for the Association since 1946. She represented the highway transportation industry before the Kansas Legislature throughout her 51 years with the agency. Just before her retirement, January 17, 1997 was declared Mary E. Turkington Day in Topeka and the state of Kansas by Governor Bill Graves and Topeka Mayor Butch Felker. She has been known as "The First Lady of Kansas Trucking."



The Intercounty Connector Opens – Come Check it Out!



Join us for a visit to the Intercounty Connector (ICC)/MD 200, Maryland's first all-electronic toll road connecting eastern Montgomery and northwestern Prince George's Counties. The ICC is a state of the art highway where tolls are collected at highway speeds using E-ZPass® as vehicles pass beneath tolling gantries. As a variably-priced facility, toll rates vary by time of day and day of the week to help maintain free-flowing traffic conditions. Currently, 5.65 miles of the nearly 18 mile roadway is complete and open to traffic. Construction on the remainder of the roadway is scheduled for completion in two phases beginning late 2011/early 2012.

The tour will begin at the Western Operations Facility (WOF) in Montgomery County and then move onto the mainline ICC at Shady Grove Road/I-370 continuing east to Georgia Avenue/MD 97, then reverse direction and head back to the WOF.
