








Who Owns the Plate?

Processing Current vs. Backlog Transactions




- There are TEN (10) states where ownership of the plate is transferred with the vehicle upon sale
- Processing backlogged violations is risky for these states
- Potential errors in reuse of previously obtained registered owner information
- Mitigate mistaken identity issues using ownership effective dates where possible

Plate Typing

- Nearly 40% of all vehicles using the interstate system are non-passenger vehicles
- Defaulting to a specific registration plate type (i.e. Passenger, Comm., etc.) can result in wrong registered owner
- Many states do not provide access to their Apportioned or Motor Carrier Databases (Ex. Maine, Indiana, Wisconsin)
- For these states, at a minimum, plate typing can be used to disqualify the transaction
- 11 states and Nlets require a plate type on input




- Multiple returns from some states for single query discernable using plate type
- Drastically reduced hit rates on rear ONLY photos



State-Specific Contracts to Obtain Data are Required



 DPPA (Drivers Privacy Protection Act of 1994) and other data security concerns precipitates actions at some DMV's to require state and local government agencies contract directly with them




 9 States require an agreement or MOU with the Tollway to gain access to DMV data: Arizona, California, Connecticut, Illinois, Iowa, Michigan, New Jersey, New York, and Virginia

National Law Enforcement Telecommunications System **Nlets as a Data Source**


- Nlets is the pre-eminent interstate law enforcement network in the nation for the exchange of law enforcement and related justice information
- Tollways will most likely be issued a restricted ORI (s-ORI)
- ORI (Originating Agency Indicator) issued to law enforcement and other agencies to access Nlets
- 38 states participate in Nlets registered owner retrieval process for s-ORI's
- <u>Restricted access states</u>: Alaska, Arizona, California, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Nebraska, New Hampshire, New Jersey, South Dakota, and Texas
- Nlets alone is not a viable solution for open tolling
- Canadian information available for unrestricted ORI'S only







Multi-Source DMV Solution



- Recommend a combination of direct relationships with DMV's and Nlets
- Dedicated resources to maintain DMV relationships and information flow from DMV's and Nlets
- Restrict reuse of previously acquired data to ensure correct identification of toll customer or violator
