Additional Questions for Readers of the Book of "Biased" by Jennifer L. Eberhardt, PhD.

1. Facial Recognition (p. 17)

"Because our experiences in the world are reflected in our brains, might our expertise in recognizing faces of our own race – and failing to recognize those of others – display its own neurobiological signature as well?" How does the author ascertain these facial recognitions lead to bias?

2. Nurturing Bias - Bias Contagion (p. 39)

The power of parents - biased parents raising biased children. Can we elaborate what the author is saying ? How true is this?

3. Lighter vs Darker Skin (p. 130)

How free people think - Dr. Ebersole points to indicators that darker-skinned Black men are more likely to get harsher sentences for the same offense as lighter-skinned Black men. Consequently, that dark skin "looked" more black. Let's discuss inside and outside the racial lines what this means.

4. **The Comfort of Home** (p. 163-164)

Immigrants, polluted people - Immigrants considered dirty, "filthy" or disease-carrying bias. Tell story of Mauricio's grandfather in the Holocaust who was a "desirable" in Hitler reign and how his grandfather was taught and felt he was spared death in Auschwitz because he kept himself clean and presentable. Earning more value to the Nazis.

5. "White is a sign of purity, Black is a sign of something else." (p. 166 and p. 167) Absorbing Spaces - Associating in Christianity "black" as immoral; and

Association allows skin color to be a value judgment. The author states her reasoning. Do you agree or disagree and why?

6. Next Door (p. 189)

Technology story and next door app served as a tool for bias. How was bias addressed by the app owners?
